

## **DAS Archaeology Lecture Course 2016**

## LATE IMPERIAL AND EARLY CHRISTIAN ROME

**Tutor: Prof Val Maxfield** 

Monday afternoons, 1.30 – 3.30pm, starting January 11th; at DAS HQ, Berkeley House, Dix's Field, Exeter

The chronological scope of this course will cover the years from the walling of the imperial City in the face of crisis in the later third century, through the Diocletianic revival, the period of Constantine and the development of Christian Rome up to about the 8th century AD.

Themes to be explored will include: the City defences; Constantine and the Christianization of Rome; changing burial practices, imperial mausolea and catacombs; early churches and church architecture and the reuse of pagan monuments.

The course will consist of eight 2-hour lecture sessions, each with a tea/coffee break in the middle and plenty of opportunity for discussion. There will be no essays to write, nor exams to take, but students will be encouraged to read around the subject. Members of DAS may borrow from the Society's Library.

**Val Maxfield** is Emeritus Professor of Roman Archaeology at Exeter University. Her research interests are in the Roman army and the frontier areas of the Roman Empire and she has conducted survey and excavation across the Roman world, from Hadrian's Wall in the north, to the Eastern Desert of Egypt in the south. She is a past-president of both Devon and Cornwall Archaeological Societies, and current editor of DAS. She has led study tours in Britain and abroad, including those to Rome and the Bay of Naples.
